## PSYCHOLOGY IN SCOTLAND

## **SUMMER 2018**

This program is based in Edinburgh, home of the imposing Edinburgh Castle, many wonderful free museums, and the University of Edinburgh, where students and faculty will live. The residence halls are a short bus ride from central Edinburgh, making it easy to take advantage of everything the city has to offer.

Students will gain an appreciation for Scottish history and culture as they study psychology abroad with two professors, Drs. Carol Terry and Robert Terry. Robert Terry helped create and lead the original Psychology in Scotland program in 2013 and is pleased to be returning with his fourth group of students. Dr. Carol Terry, a clinical psychologist and adjunct professor in psychology, is leading a group for the first time.

Robert Terry, whose emphasis is quantitative psychology, will teach the "The course. capstone Skeptical Psychologist." Students may use this course for something other than their official capstone, if necessary. Carol Terry will teach "Psychopathology in Fiction." All applicants should consult with their academic advisers regarding degree credits for these courses.

One overnight guided excursion to The Highlands is included in the program cost. Likely stops will be Loch Ness, Eileen Donan Castle, the William Wallace memorial, Glenfinnan Viaduct, and Ben Nevis, the highest mountain in Great Britain.

There also will be a day trip to the border area with England. Students will get to see parts of Northumbria and visit Alnwick Castle, where filming for the first two Harry Potter movies took place.

The coursework in CANVAS begins on May 23, prior to departure for Scotland. In contrast to the previous version of this program, there is no time built in for independent travel. Participants who want more time abroad should schedule it after the program dates in Scotland. Because a paper and final exam are due one month after the Scotland dates, students should consult with Robert Terry before planning extra travel.

Applications are first-come, first-served, with a cap of 26 students. Applicants are required to meet with <u>Karen Elmore</u>, Director of Arts and Sciences International Programs, and attend a <u>Study Abroad 101</u> session, as part of a completed application.
